Guide for Participating Teachers

International Virtual Mobility - UMET

This guide is aimed at UMET teachers who participate in virtual academic activities with foreign universities. It includes practical guidelines for planning, coordinating and developing virtual mobility classes.

1. What is virtual mobility?

It is the participation in synchronous or asynchronous academic activities with higher education institutions abroad, without the need to physically travel. It may include:

- Mirror classes: shared sessions between teachers and students from two universities.
- COIL projects: virtual collaborative work between students from different countries with faculty support.
- Global Interaction Log: Where the student accesses materials from a foreign university (podcast, video, article), studies them and responds to a small reflection or creative activity in a digital log.
- Virtual Cultural Passport: Where the student must virtually "visit" 3 countries
 through cultural content (videos of universities, virtual tours, documentaries,
 etc.), complete a form for each country and at the end receives an international
 digital passport.
- International Masterclass: a short master class (45 to 90 minutes), given by a
 professor or expert from a foreign university, on a global, innovative or
 professional topic.

2. Objectives of virtual mobility

- To promote the internationalization of the curriculum.
- To develop intercultural and digital competencies in teachers and students.
- Promote networking and international academic cooperation.
- Enrich academic content with global perspectives.

3. Requirements for UMET faculty

- $\sqrt{}$ Have the time to coordinate and plan with the foreign university.
- √ Openness to intercultural collaboration and pedagogical adaptation.

4. Stages of participation

Stage 1: Planning and coordination

- Contact between teaching peers (UMET and foreign university).
- Alignment of learning objectives.
- Design of shared schedule.
- Definition of joint activities (single class or COIL project).

Stage 2: Execution

- Development of the class or project.
- Use of agreed virtual platforms.
- Registration of attendance, participation and incidences.

Stage 3: Evaluation and feedback

- Application of satisfaction survey.
- Final teacher report.
- Recommendations for future editions.

5. Pedagogical recommendations

- Plan participatory activities: debates, surveys, brainstorming, forums.
- Contextualize your class: briefly explain the reality of Ecuador and UMET.
- Encourage intercultural collaboration: assign tasks in international pairs.
